

Every one here is canning everything cannable and drying the other things. We do not intend to have to call on the red cross this winter if money can be had for shoes and underwear.

Mamie came and stayed three weeks with her family. The last week they were here Stanley, Marie and their two children came for a week. So we had, counting the two colored girls eighteen and twenty at home all the time.

We've put in some new steel tables, like the five and ten uses, and rebuilt the shelving until we lock quite city-fied for a little town.


A salesman is here now and Walter wants me to help him buy some little household stuff.
